Bobby goes the extra mile for Ailey

Six-year-old Ailey from Ayrshire has the rare genetic disorder Wolf-Hirschhorn syndrome.

Ailey and her mum previously visited the hospital in Glasgow for regular sleep studies, as Ailey's condition can cause her to wake up to 20 times per hour. Each study involved four trips, covering more than 100 miles. in 48 hours.

Now, Ailey can do her sleep studies at home thanks to volunteers like Bobby, who deliver and collect the specialist equipment from families across Scotland.

Shaping the future of child health in Scotland

After 20 years, we're still taking every step forward together – with your hand in theirs.

With your help we can remain at the forefront of paediatric health, and ensure that children from across Scotland receive world-class care here in Glasgow. In 2021 we invested £200,000 to support the creation of the Children's Centre for Health Innovation. The Centre will support NHS staff as they work on pioneering projects with the potential to transform treatment and healthcare for a wide range of conditions. This builds on a number of existing, highlyimpactful digital innovations developed by clinical teams with our support, helping to improve the care and health of children both locally and further afield. Many more children and families in the future will benefit from the exciting developments enabled by the Centre.





Epilepsy in Scotland - a breakthrough

We were proud to contribute to research by Dr Joe Symonds, whose research into epilepsy was recently published in the leading neurology journal, Brain.

Dr Symonds discovered that the most disadvantaged children in Scotland have a significantly higher incidence of epilepsy. This important discovery will help to shape and improve the support available to these children and their families in the future.

Megan Clapperton is at the forefront of research into tonsillitis in the UK, and recently presented her breakthrough results at the internationally renowned Microscience Microscopy Congress.

Megan's PhD, funded by the charity, can help us learn more about how best to test and treat tonsillitis, with the ultimate aim of preventing the need for surgery.

When a wee one has their tonsils removed in Glasgow, Megan takes them away to study in her lab – earning her the nickname Tonsil Fairy!
